Fiber Handling and Disposal Broken fiber ends and scraps are extremely sharp and can penetrate skin. All fiber scraps must be collected in dedicated, sealed containers and disposed of properly to prevent injury or contamination (FOA) . Hands should be kept away from the face, and work areas should remain clean, with no food or beverages present (Fluke Networks) . Tools like visual fault detectors and power meters help detect active fibers safely without direct eye exposure.
