

# The core switch speed is only 1000Mbps



## AI Overview

A core switch operating at 1000Mbps (1Gbps) is functioning at standard Gigabit Ethernet speed, but issues like cable quality, port negotiation, or connected device limitations can prevent achieving full performance. Understanding the Speed Gigabit Ethernet is designed to deliver up to 1000Mbps, also called 1Gbps, whereas older Fast Ethernet operates at 100Mbps. If your switch shows 1000Mbps, it is already at its rated speed, but traffic may appear slower due to other factors. A link will always operate at the lowest speed of the connected devices; for example, if a Gigabit switch is connected to a 100Mbps router port, the effective speed for that link will be 100Mbps.

**Common Causes of Reduced Speeds**

- Cable Issues:** Gigabit Ethernet requires all 8 wires in a Cat5e or higher cable to be intact. Damaged, pinched, or poorly terminated cables can force the connection to fall back to 100Mbps to maintain stability. Even minor physical stress, like stepping on a cable, can reduce speed.
- Auto-Negotiation Problems:** Switch ports and NICs use auto-negotiation to determine speed and duplex. If there is a mismatch or the port fails to negotiate correctly, the speed may drop to 100Mbps. Sometimes, simply reconnecting the cable or bouncing the switchport resolves the issue.
- Device Limitations:** If the connected device (router, PC, or server NIC) only supports 100Mbps, the switch will operate at that speed for that link. Ensure all devices in the path support Gigabit speeds.
- Incorrect NIC Settings or Drivers:** Outdated network drivers or manually set speed/duplex settings on the NIC can conflict with the switch's auto-negotiation, causing reduced speeds.

**Solutions to Achieve Full Gigabit Performance**

- Check and replace cables with certified Cat5e or Cat6 cables, ensuring all 8 wires are properly connected.**
- Reconnect or reset ports:** Unplug and replug cables or bounce the switchport to force re-negotiation.
- Verify device capabilities:** Confirm that all connected devices support 1Gbps and update NIC drivers if necessary.
- Avoid using adapters or couplers that may not support all 8 wires...**
